# Message from the President



Michael J. Quaranta

The start to 2019 was a big success for the Delaware State Chamber of Commerce as over 1,000 people gathered at our 182nd Annual Dinner. The evening celebrated the accomplishments of Josh and Cynthia Martin, who were awarded the Marvel Cup, and the success Chemours has had under the leadership of CEO Mark Vergnano. The event also recognized

the lifelong achievements in the field of public service of former Delaware State Representative Joe DiPinto. At our business meeting, we welcomed Tony Allen of Delaware State University, Stephanie Wiswall of Astra Zeneca, and Jason Gonzalez of DuPont to our Board of Directors.

We also welcomed the beginning of the 150th General Assembly and Governor Carney's "State of the State" address. Later in January, the first glimpse of policy priorities was unveiled when the Governor offered his Fiscal Year 2020 budget. Everybody knows that a budget, whether it's your personal, household, or business budget, is an expression of your priorities. The State budget is no different. I was heartened to see continued evidence of targeted spending on early childhood development and workforce training and development in the Governor's 2019 Budget. These are key spending priorities and they are critical to our future success. Our members need employees with good analytical skills, leadership abilities, the flexibility to work in groups or independently, and the soft skills customers and colleagues expect. To that end, the budget invests \$32.7 million dollars in early learning, almost \$900,000 more funding for the SEED and Inspire programs, and over \$800,000 more for the BSN, diesel mechanic program, Pathways partnerships and more at Delaware Technical Community College. The plan also includes \$15 million in funding for the Higher Education Economic Development Investment Fund to supplement investments that are being made to improve job growth and economic development in the State.

The year is off to a fast start and we are fully engaged on your behalf. # Association of Chambers Agenda to Help Business Across Delaware

THIS FALL, Delaware's 14 chambers of commerce got together to brainstorm a unified legislative and regulatory agenda that would benefit businesses of all sizes across the state. From maintaining family friendly beaches, to investing in broadband infrastructure in Kent and Sussex counties, to paving the way for competitive association health plans, this list of priorities runs the gamut of issues, and is supported by industry groups throughout Delaware.

These initiatives, while not exhaustive, provide a road map on where we think successful efforts can be made to help businesses grow in Delaware.

### DSCC LEGISLATIVE PRIORITIES

#### Infrastructure/Technology

- Bring more broadband options to Sussex/Kent counties
- Address known prevailing wage issues
  - Redesign survey to improve accuracy of data
  - Use updated data to revamp wage rate calculation
- Curtail increased utility costs by avoiding new mandates on residential and commercial payers

#### Health Insurance/Health Care costs

- Focus on underwriting regulations at Department of Insurance to allow varied options for employer health care policies including association plans

#### Tourism

- Create statewide accommodations tax for person to person short term rentals
- Focus on environmental issues (clean water, storm water regulations, etc.)
- Make sure Delaware beaches remain family friendly


# Legislative Priority

## Workforce Development

- Focus on technical/vocational training
  - Identify currently untapped Pathways program material
  - Identify work-based learning programs to partner/expand/develop curriculum
    - Work with tech schools to support vocational study
    - Help develop coding curriculum for general education across the state

## Regulations/Permitting

- Work to create culture change at permitting agencies to help streamline permitting process without sacrificing public health and safety
- Work to create “common app” approach to permitting
  - One stop for all applications, forms, etc. for permitting a project or starting a business for state, local, municipal regulations



The Association of Chambers will be highlighting the importance of these initiatives to members of the General Assembly and state agencies, and that solutions can come by working together. Examples of the issues to be solved and approaches to solve them can be found later in this edition in an article written by Guy Marozzi. None of these proposals by themselves are meant as a silver bullet to address Delaware’s long-term economic goals, but taken together they certainly put us on the right path.

## BUSINESS SPOTLIGHT: Holmes Smith Consulting Services

» At some point everyone has likely felt some type of anxiety when planning for their future, especially when deciding to pursue higher education. This is an important decision and, potentially, a huge investment. Holmes Smith Consulting Services (HSCS) aims to make this process easier and less taxing.

HSCS offers customized college planning services, from choosing the right school to applying for financial aid and scholarships. Dr. Patricia Smith founded HSCS after noticing a need for both parents and students to receive individualized and customized college planning services. With over 30 years of experience working in higher education she saw first-hand how stressful college planning can be. She was able to identify four main issues that create the most anxiety related to college planning. Those issues are finding schools aligned with specific academic, career, and financial needs; locating scholarships and other financial resources; navigating through the college planning process; and investing well to get a return. With these issues in mind and a goal to ease the college planning process, she founded HSCS.

Though they are small in size, HSCS proves that they are able to handle the need for college planning services in Delaware by working with families all over the state. At first, HSCS used their connections through the Delaware State Chamber of Commerce to network with other business leaders, receive insight

on how to use resources for small businesses, and find mentors. They also signed an agreement with the Boys & Girls Clubs of Delaware, one of their first major clients, to develop and offer a statewide community-based College Awareness and Planning (CAP) program.

After founding HSCS, Dr. Smith continued to make an impact on the college planning industry, establishing the Parents & Guardians College Planning Conference in 2013 in partnership with HSCS. The conference was founded to provide parents and guardians of middle

and high school students with resources to effectively navigate the college planning process. Each year, scholarships are awarded to high school students whose parents and guardians attend the conference. Over \$40,000 in college scholarships have been awarded to date thanks to the generosity of the business community and individual donors. The 7th Annual College Planning Conference for Parents and Guardians will be held on May 18, 2019, at the Greater Dover Boys & Girls Club.

Students all over Delaware have been positively impacted by Dr. Smith's

passion for aiding in the college planning process. Her expertise in the field and her extensive experience in higher education has allowed HSCS to help over 300 families over eight years through direct college planning services, and over 900 Boys & Girls Club members through the CAP program. HSCS services students from public, private and charter schools and have also extended their services to families of middle and elementary school age children and businesses and employees who wish to pursue continuing education.

GOVERNOR JOHN CARNEY gave opening remarks at the Annual Dinner and shared many of the State’s accomplishments, plus things to look forward to in 2019.

- Unemployment is at 3.8% for the first time since the recession in 2008.
- The state budget surplus has grown to nearly \$200 million compared to a deficit almost twice that almost two years ago.
- We converted much of our State economic development functions into a public private partnership, the Delaware Prosperity Partnership.

ANOTHER AWARD was given by the Delaware State Chamber of Commerce at the event - the Honorable Joseph G. DiPinto was presented with the esteemed Dick DiSabatino Award.

The Dick DiSabatino Award, named for former DSCC Chairman Richard DiSabatino Sr., was established in the mid-90s to recognize significant contributions to shape opinion and public policy in the state of Delaware. The rarely given honor was last presented in 2013 to John H. Taylor Jr., Executive Director of the Delaware Public Policy Institute (DPPI).

Mr. DiPinto served for 20 years as a Delaware State Representative. He chaired the Housing and Community Affairs, Appropriation Committees and was the co-chair of the Joint Finance Committee for eight years. Prior to that, he was on the Wilmington City Council for over a decade. He was appointed Director of Wilmington’s Office of Economic Development by Mayor James M. Baker in 2006.

Former Delaware Representative Roger Roy presented the award. “The winner is a man with a strong intellect and a healthy sense of humor. He is a Republican that didn’t just talk about bi-partisan cooperation, he lived it. He was never shy about expressing his own ideas and opinions, but he was always open to the ideas and opinions of others as well. He always looked for ways to work toward a cooperative solution,” said Roy.

A Delaware native, DiPinto was employed by the DuPont Company for 36 years after earning his Bachelor of Science in chemical engineering from University of Notre Dame. He is involved with many community and nonprofit organizations, including but not limited to, Delaware Commission on Italian Heritage and Culture, Riverfront Development Commission, Delaware Science and Technology Commission, St. Francis Hospital, Ronald McDonald House, Ministry of Caring and WHY.



## Developing Delaware Real Estate for Success

ONE CAN TELL QUITE A BIT about a community by the state of its buildings, which are both a foundation for its history and a powerful indicator of its future. As a developer, owner and manager of 6 million square feet of real estate across Delaware, Newport-based Harvey, Hanna & Associates knows the importance of keeping its fingers on what is powering the local, regional and national economies first-hand. By presenting a range of residential, office, industrial and other commercial spaces to prospective tenants, the company helps the state attract and retain thousands of jobs.

Since its co-founding in 1997 by Thomas J. Hanna and Thom Harvey, Harvey Hanna has always been a company made up overwhelmingly of Delawareans, all of whom have experienced the transformation of the state's economy over the last two decades. Manufacturing has largely vacated its place as a main driver of jobs and industry, and more and more young people are shifting their lives away from the suburbs and toward large, urban transit-oriented centers. As a result, Delaware now stands at a crossroads that will determine its fortunes in the years to come.

While Harvey Hanna has never taken a single dollar of public funding for any of its projects, the company is always conscious that its success is inextricably linked to the cooperation it receives from all levels of government in Delaware. It believes that partnership must continue to be strengthened if the state is to remain competitive in the years and decades to come.


One such collaboration between the public and private sectors is evident in Harvey Hanna's ongoing work at the former General Motors plant in Wilmington, where the state's long-term economic shifts are evident to all. For nearly six decades, the General Motors facility served as one of the main economic engines for northern Delaware, employing more than 6,000 people at the height of its production in the 1970s. The tens of thousands of Chevrolets, Pontiacs, Saturns and other vehicles that poured off the line in Wilmington were emblematic of a state that prided itself on the honest, quintessentially American work of manufacturing.

Circumstances have changed drastically since then, however, both here and nationally. Today, just 8 percent of U.S. workers are employed in manufacturing – a massive drop from the 22 percent share that the sector held in 1970. Although federal policies are seeking to restore the presence of manufacturing in America, Harvey Hanna is doing its part to further the regional economy by transforming the former General Motors property – which has now sat dormant for almost a decade – into a modern logistics and light assembly campus designed to appeal to industries on the rise that can help power Delaware through the 21st century.

Thanks to the continued cooperation of local, county and state officials and regulatory agencies, the transformation of the former plant was able to begin shortly after Harvey Hanna acquired it in 2017. After an extensive,

but regrettably unsuccessful, search for a new manufacturing company to occupy the former GM space, the company recently began the demolition of the plant's 3 million square feet of factory space, in order to clear the way for a state-of-the-art campus designed specifically to capitalize on the rapid rise of e-commerce and the steadily rising demand for logistics and light assembly facilities. The transformation is based on Harvey Hanna's belief that the redevelopment will create thousands of jobs for the Wilmington and New Castle County areas and begin to fill the economic void that was created when General Motors departed in 2009.

Fortunately, Delaware – with its dense population in the northern part of the state, educated workforce, growing seaport, nimble decision makers and elected leaders, and a highway system that places the state just a day's drive to more than 30 percent of the nation's population, as well as parts of eastern Canada – is ideally positioned to benefit from the rise of e-commerce and logistics. Harvey Hanna has completed similar transformations in the past, including the redevelopment of a former Chicago Bridge & Iron factory in New Castle into the thriving Twin Spans Business Park, and is hopeful its plan in Wilmington can help further what is fast becoming a new model for outdated and neglected industrial sites.

Of course, drawing large corporate tenants to Delaware requires selling not just companies but also their employees, who are seeking a full range of amenities that appeal to a modern lifestyle. While the state lacks a major urban market to help draw corporations and their staff, there are many ways governments and private enterprises can work together to create the kind of vibrant, walkable communities today's workers are demanding.

Harvey Hanna is planning to do just that in its native Newport, where it is moving toward the creation of a transit-oriented downtown through the development of more than 400,000 square feet of mixed-use space, including more than 300 multi-family residential units, a retail brand hotel and approximately 80,000 square feet of retail and commercial use. The company is also working closely with local officials and other stakeholders to create a network of biking and walking trails along the Christina River and to reactivate the hamlet's SEPTA commuter rail station. As it continues its remaking Wilmington's former GM plant in order to attract thousands of new jobs to the area, Harvey Hanna recognizes it is just as important to provide those workers with a vibrant environment where they can live, shop, dine and play.

But adapting real estate for tomorrow's economy also extends well beyond creating new jobs and places to live. In today's work climate, workers and their families put an added emphasis on time spent away from home, and Delaware's beautiful beaches are in prime position to command their hard-earned vacation budgets. Harvey Hanna and its affiliate enterprises are leading the charge to do just that and are now close to completing another of the state's largest redevelopment projects – the mixed-use Lighthouse Cove project in Dewey Beach.

Launched in 2013, the redevelopment is comprised of Delaware's first Hyatt Place hotel, 83 luxury condominiums (including 30 new bayside units that will hit the market later this year), and plans for a restaurant and premier wedding, banquet and conference center. # Fairview Campus:

## A Model for School Development

UNDER THE LEADERSHIP of former Superintendent Dr. Tony Marchio and current Superintendent Dr. Matthew Burrows, the Appoquinimink School District undertook the task of creating a vision of what will become the model for school development—not only in Delaware, but across the country.

Dr. Marchio had the vision in 2009 to create a public school, K-12 campus that would serve the growing school district comprising residents of the Middletown-Odessa-Townsend area. That vision was confirmed by the residents of the District in 2009 and reconfirmed by those same residents in 2016 under the leadership of Dr. Burrows and resulted in the construction of the Fairview Campus in Townsend.

Traditionally, most school development has been one school on one parcel of land, with associated bus routes. This type of development requires the expense of costly infrastructure improvements that only serve the one school, as well as adding redundant bus traffic in neighborhoods and on local roads.

Master planning began in 2010 with ABHA Architects and Landmark Science & Engineering working together with the owner to address the District's needs and to assess the site's development capacity. This effort grew into the development team of architectural joint venture ABHA/BSA+A, construction manager EDis Company, and civil engineer Landmark Science & Engineering, who were tasked with creating a school campus that could be designed and constructed in phases to meet the vision and needs of the District, while minimizing development costs.

The concept was to create individual buildings that are interconnected with all other facilities on the campus. The plan called for a central green with all classroom buildings having frontage on the green and an inner loop road for parent drop-off of students that is segregated from bus, staff, and student parking by directing those vehicles to an outer loop road. Vehicle access to the separated loop roads is via a single, dual lane entrance/exit. A sports complex with

shared athletic fields, tennis courts, and a stadium with LED lighting for night time events, with a 3,000-person seating capacity, is situated with direct access to the outer loop.

The plan has been realized. Dr. Burrows confirmed that “Instead of constructing two typical cafeterias, libraries, and auditoriums, we chose to situate our new middle school and high school side-by-side in an L-shaped configuration. Then we created an innovative design that shares these spaces. This enabled us to develop a performing arts center that resembles a professional theatre experience. We’ve created access for middle schoolers to pursue advanced-level studies in high school. We’ve designed specialized learning centers where teens will develop vocational skills and career-based linkages; and created a library that supports not just reading & research, but the development of cutting-edge technology skills, and creative spaces to talk, collaborate, invent and explore in a hands-on manner.”


When the campus is fully constructed in August 2020, it will serve approximately 4,000 students. The first two schools, Spring Meadow Early Childhood Center and Old State Elementary, were completed in August 2012.

### Innovative Parking Plan

As individual schools, a total of 2,856 parking spaces would be required, but with a full campus facility—given the ability to share parking and by striping bus parking areas for personal parking areas during peak night time events—we were able to reduce the number of parking spaces by approximately 1,000 spaces...approximately 10 acres of parking! The reduction in paving, while reducing the overall site construction cost, also had a positive impact on the environment by reducing the amount of stormwater flowing through treatment facilities and allowing the rainfall to naturally recharge the groundwater via larger lawn areas. ■

# Wilmington University Opens New Campus

IF YOU DRIVE ALONG Route 202/Concord Pike near the Delaware - Pennsylvania state line, you've likely seen Wilmington University's newest location. Serving northern New Castle County, Chester and Delaware Counties in Pennsylvania, WilmU's new Brandywine Valley site opened its doors to students on January 14th.

The 50,000 square foot, three-story building houses both administrative offices and 21 classrooms as well as four computer labs, a health lab for clinical nursing training and assessments, a library, an art room and state-of-the-art chemistry and biology laboratories. It also has its own food service café, an internet café and a campus book store. According to Dr. Erin DiMarco, Wilmington University senior vice president and chief operating officer, "The new facility can accommodate up to 1,000 students a day and provide them with a full university experience closer to home."

Wilmington University's 150 degree programs, from undergraduate through doctoral classes, are offered at the Brandywine Hundred site,

which puts emphasis on science and technology. Students benefit from the new learning commons – six classrooms that invite collaboration and enhance remote learning via livestream and high tech whiteboards.

"If students at our Dover location want to take advantage of a class or training session at the Brandywine building, they don't have to travel," says DiMarco. "There are six rooms on this campus that have livestream capability, which allows inclusion of students at other locations. If an instructor is teaching at Brandywine, it won't be unusual for the class to include remote student participation from Dover or our New Castle main campus. It's another convenience we can now offer."

The red brick, stone and glass construction of the Brandywine building reflects the character of the surrounding Brandywine Valley while it also retains WilmU's well-recognized red brick architectural signature. The building is filled with natural light from many windows that look out into the First State National Historical Park, and its LED lighting fixtures also provide light that mimics that of the outdoors. Between classes, students can walk the grounds,



which include woodland walking paths and a pond.

This is the first of three buildings approved and planned for the Brandywine campus. Two more buildings will be constructed, each up to 60,000 square feet. Throughout the planning process, the university sought out student opinion to discover the most desirable features to include at the new location. As a result, more classrooms were included in the building's design, and a new auditorium is planned for future construction.

While the New Castle location will remain the university's main campus and continue to house the majority of its administrative offices, the Brandywine campus is much more convenient to a large percentage of WilmU students in the Wilmington area. # Bringing Tradition and Innovation Together

THE CHEMOURS COMPANY moved into its newly renovated, state-of-the-art global headquarters in the historic DuPont Building in January, renewing its commitment to the City of Wilmington and beginning a new chapter in the young company's four-year history.


The move also marks a new beginning for the 106-year old DuPont Building, a registered historic landmark which occupies an entire city block in downtown Wilmington. The building also includes Hotel DuPont and The Playhouse on Rodney Square.

"This building is a perfect metaphor for our company. At Chemours, we call ourselves 'a 200-year-old startup,' and parts of this building will have the feel of a startup and parts of this building will connect to that 200-year old history," Chemours Chief Executive Officer Mark Vergnano declared in a speech at the company's ribbon-cutting event on January 15. The event was attended by U.S. Senator Tom Carper, Delaware Governor John Carney, Wilmington Mayor Mike Purzycki and more than 100 other local government, business, and community leaders.

Chemours was spun-off from DuPont and became a standalone company in 2015. Later that year, the company began evaluating potential locations for its global headquarters in Delaware, New Jersey and Pennsylvania. Chemours chose Wilmington because of the area's highly educated local workforce, close proximity to several key customers, and favorable changes to the state's corporate tax structure.

The company moved into the DuPont Building, now owned and operated by The Buccini/Pollin Group, after a 20-month renovation that transformed the building's interior into a light-filled, modern and elegant open workspace environment. Both Chemours and The Buccini/Pollin Group are members of the Delaware State Chamber of Commerce.

Approximately 850 employees, contractors and consultants will work in Chemours' new headquarters, which will occupy 280,000 square feet in



11 stories of the building. The open floorplan was designed to maximize natural light throughout the building, and the new workspaces are equipped with sit/stand desks and ergonomic chairs. Every aspect of the renovation was designed with the company's employees and their well-being in mind, Vergnano said.

More than 500 panels of reclaimed marble were salvaged from the original building and used in the renovation, preventing nearly 50 tons of material from entering landfills. Additionally, the building contains more than 70 conference rooms, a video recording studio with cutting-edge technology and a large, ornate event space named 'The Nobel Room,' which was once the original ballroom in the Hotel DuPont.

"While every one of us will walk every day into a building that has more than a century of history, we'll come to work in a corporate headquarters that is sleek, open and modern – just like the company that we're building together," Vergnano said at the ribbon cutting. ■

# Timeliness is the Bridge between Effective Regulation and Economic Development

## EFFECTIVE REGULATION

and regulatory timeliness need to go hand in hand for a prosperous economy. Regulations protect public health, natural resources, property and our rights. We need rules and standards and everyone intuitively knows it. The business community seeks certainty, consistency and timely decision making to flourish as it navigates changing markets and plans for the future.

History has often demonstrated that new regulation increases the cost and time to keep businesses vibrant. It introduces new challenges and often requires retaining expensive experts, including engineers and attorneys, to meet standards and successfully move through multiple regulatory processes.

At the same time, new regulation is often needed to address contemporary issues. Regulatory agencies must assess the potential impact that the expansion of businesses can have on air quality, traffic congestion, flooding, groundwater and other resources. While having these concerns, reasonable people would agree that fostering new and expanded businesses in Delaware is necessary for Delaware's long term economic vitality by preserving the tax base, offering Delawareans access to conveniences and creating jobs opportunities for the future.

Let's take a look at some realistic examples of development in Delaware.

If you were a business selling to consumers and about to risk a lot of your money on a new location, wouldn't you want to develop in a populous area with abundant transportation? Of course you would. However, it's likely that the nearest intersection satisfy your target site is at or near capacity so any additional business activity will congest it further. When this circumstance reaches the regulators a conundrum of goals arises: Allowing development or easing traffic congestion.

What are the alternatives? One is to deny the project. Another is to improve the road and perhaps another is a compromise that meets both adjectives by agreeing on what needs to be done and who pays for what. Without clear direction, the process slows and brings contention.

All the while, this process, especially for routine projects that don't gather high level support, can wax and wane in the regulatory review



process, often for a year or more. Add an additional year for construction and you have 2 years of commitment, without certainty to hope that the market demand does not change. This scenario is common and leaves Delaware at a disadvantage.

What about the big projects, with lots of high-paying blue collar jobs?

If you have been paying attention to energy these last dozen years, you may have noticed an incredible cycle of changes. Just think about energy prices and energy sources which have been through many sea changes of drivers during over these last dozen years. Now imagine you are a CEO of an energy company and have to stake your job and reputation on convincing your shareholders to make a large investment into a large new business sector. While it may take a year to permit and construct a routine retail project, it could take 3 years to obtain permits and exhaust appeals and another year or two of construction for a timeline of 4 or 5 years. Even if your business plan was resilient enough to make pivots to stay aligned with rapidly changing market conditions, permits would likely not be flexible enough to allow these changes without substantial rework. If you were that CEO, wouldn't you hesitate and perhaps not move ahead with good caution?

Both examples do not advantage Delaware over other locations. Because of our small size, we can change these scenarios into a competitive edge.

## What can Delaware do to Gain Advantage?

We have to change the debate on “what and how” we regulate to “how fast we can effectively regulate”. Business will adjust to known requirements and timelines. The market will respond to certainty and speed in regulation. In doing so, the State of Delaware can significantly enhance its ability to remain economically viable.

Specific steps could include the following.

- Objectively inventory holistic approval timelines for a representative cross section of projects from initiation of occupancy. Some agencies such as DelDOT and New Castle County Land Use have implemented steps for their projects, but we need to evaluate the whole. Once the facts are known, let’s have a public discussion on what is a reasonable timeline and start refining the regulatory process to achieve these goals. Objective data will enable us to see common elements of both long and short duration approvals and encourage best practices towards shorter timelines. It will also show redundancies, repetitive decision-making and opportunities for concurrent progress.
- Clearly define what is permissible in all zonings. Let’s answer quickly with “what” can be built and “how big.” These questions are best answered with more detail in the zoning regulations and in the political process. The Town of Middletown is a shining example of this approach.
- Particularly in New Castle County, where the Administration has already identified this issue, we have to address how to allow development in desirable congested areas without piecemeal transportation solutions.

- Don’t require full design detail in the public approval process of “what and how big.” These details can be worked concurrently and resolved by the professional designers and regulators as they are now. Final accountability should be with the Certificate of Occupancy. Such a process will speed all projects by allowing simultaneous activities as well as allowing developers to speculatively get approvals and have “construction ready” sites to advantage Delaware in attracting new business and keeping existing ones.

- Inventory other hidden and compounding delays such as public notice periods and appeal processes and seek consensus on a reasonable collective time standard that both speeds the process and allows an attentive public to be notified and have a voice.

- Consideration could be given to a non-judicial appeal authority for all regulation and establishing the highest possibly bar to appeal to the courts.

The last 15-20 years has showed us that Delaware has impending challenges that can be mitigated through well balanced regulation and economic development. It all works if we can just do it faster. ■

# Deciding on the Choice of Business Entity Under TCJA

THE CORNERSTONE OF P.L. 115-97, known as the Tax Cuts and Jobs Act is the reduction of the maximum corporate tax rate of 35% to a flat 21%. For businesses being conducted as flow-through entities, such as S corporations, partnerships and sole proprietorships, the new law permits a deduction of up to 20% of qualified business income (QBI), effectively reducing the top tax rate paid by the individual owner from 37% to 29.6%. The QBI deduction has restrictions and limitations, so not all business owners will be able to claim the deduction. Furthermore, the QBI deduction is temporary and will sunset after 2025, whereas the 21% flat corporate tax rate is permanent. The question now becomes, what is the best choice of entity to take advantage of these new rules?

If a corporation doesn't distribute its profits, it only pays the flat 21%. If the profits are distributed, they are now subject to double taxation; first at the corporate level (21%) and then at the shareholder level as a dividend (up to 23.8%). Thus, for every \$1,000 of profit, roughly 40%


would go to taxes, leaving \$600 for the shareholder. The profits of a C corporation are not eligible for the 20% QBI deduction. Corporations that wish to retain profits have two other considerations. First, the accumulated earnings tax which is assessed when a corporation accumulates earnings beyond the reasonable needs of the business (\$150,000 for personal service corporations and \$250,000 for all others) and the personal holding company tax when the company has a limited number of owners and excess passive income.

In contrast, partnership and S corporation profits flow through to the owners and are only taxed once at the individual level. These profits are eligible for the 20% QBI deduction, subject to various income limitations (beyond the scope of this article). Using the same \$1,000 profit, only \$800 ( $\$1,000 \times 80\%$ ) would be taxed to the business owner at his or her marginal rate. Assuming the top rate of 37%, \$296 ( $\$800 \times .37$ ) would go to taxes, leaving \$704 for the shareholder. Partners and LLC members would also have to consider the impact, if any, of self-employment taxes.

The above becomes more complicated under the QBI deduction rules if the business activity involves certain specified services such as healthcare, law, accounting, consulting, investment management and other personal services, the ability to combine business interests under the new rules, as well as the individual's taxable income, requiring a more extensive analysis.

Several considerations also need to be reviewed before converting between C and S status. Certain factors can preclude converting to S status including the rules limiting who can be an eligible shareholder, the limitation on the number of shareholders and the limitation on only having one class of stock. S corporations are also subject to IRS scrutiny under the reasonable compensation rules and the double taxation concept will still apply to net built-in gains on business assets as of the date of conversion if those assets are sold within 5 years of conversion. In addition, certain tax attributes such as net operating loss carryovers would be lost when the S conversion is made. Conversely, if S status is terminated (to take advantage of the 21% rate), it cannot be re-elected for 5 years.

In conclusion, selecting the right entity type under the new tax regime can save considerable federal taxes, but all factors need to be carefully weighed. ■

# NEW RULES for Meals and Entertainment

## Tax Reform Changes Every Business Owner Needs to Know

### Executive Summary:

Effective January 1, 2018, following passage of the Tax Cuts and Jobs Act of 2017 (TCJA), the tax deductions for meals and entertainment (M&E) generally fall into these three categories (the 100-50-0 rules):

- 100% deductible – these did not change:
  - M&E for recreational and social purposes primarily for employees' benefit
  - M&E included in employees' or others' taxable compensation (Form W-2 or 1099)
  - M&E sold to or reimbursed by customers and clients
  - food and beverages made available to the general public, such as presentations
- 50% deductible –
  - meals provided to current and potential clients and customers, consultants or similar business contacts where business is conducted and the taxpayer or employee is present
  - employees' in-office meals, drinks, snacks, and dining facilities for convenience of employers (formerly 100% deductible)
  - employee meals while traveling and attending meetings outside the office on business
  - M&E incurred during business meetings among employees, officers, directors and stockholders
- 0% deductible –
  - entertainment for clients, customers and prospects, including travel and parking (formerly 50% deductible)
  - meals when combined with non-deductible entertainment and not itemized on the bill (formerly 50% deductible)
  - dues and usage fees for clubs organized for social, recreational or sports purposes (usage formerly 50% deductible)
  - meals with employees, current and potential clients and customers, consultants or similar business contacts where NO business is conducted

### Background – the rules through 2017:

For many years, business meals and entertainment were 50% tax deductible as long as business was conducted. Furthermore, meals provided to employees in the office were 100% deductible. Across the board, all meals and entertainment had to pass the IRS tests of being ordinary and necessary but not lavish or extravagant, and requiring the presence of the taxpayer or an employee of the taxpayer.



### New rules starting in 2018:

In summary, as of January 1, 2018, the new rules retain deductibility of business meals at 50% but reduce the deductibility of most employee meals from 100% to 50%, and no longer allow a deduction for customer-based entertainment expenses. These new rules have necessitated further separation of meals and entertainment in your accounting records. At a minimum, I recommend using the 100/50/0 categories shown above. The IRS plans to issue proposed regulations to further define meals and entertainment, which are expected to be effective later in 2019.

### Business meals:

Half of the cost of business meals with customers, consultants or prospects is deductible provided the taxpayer claiming the deduction, or an employee of the taxpayer, is present. When entertainment is also provided, the cost of food and beverages must be shown separately on the invoice or other document or it will be lumped with entertainment and disallowed. The IRS refers to sporting events in its examples whereby the cost of game tickets are not deductible, including club box rentals. If food and beverages are bought, the cost must be clearly marked on the tickets or invoice, or purchased separately. If these requirements aren't met, meals are disallowed.

- Documentation rules have not changed. Here is what you need to show if audited by the IRS:
- Brief description of business discussed.
- Name of the vendor or restaurant providing the food and/or beverages.
- Name of the person(s) you provided the meal to, and the employee present.
- Copy of the receipt if the cost is \$75 or greater showing amount, time and date.

# Guide to Taxes

## Employee meals:

The tax deduction for food and beverages provided by a company to its employees reduced from 100% to 50%. Typically, this covers snacks and drinks stocked in the company kitchen or meals brought in for employees for the employer's convenience. The 50% rule extends to the operation of a company eating facility, as well as meals served at meetings of employees, stockholder and directors. For meal costs added to an employee's taxable income or reimbursed by a customer, the deduction is still 100%.

An exception still exists for food and beverages served as part of recreational, social or similar expenses for employees. These costs are still 100% deductible, and are intended to include events primarily for the benefit of employees, such as holiday parties, picnics, outings, and similar events.

## Entertainment:

Business-related entertainment expenses are no longer deductible. Some narrow exceptions remain, such as the cost of entertainment billed to customers, and entertainment connected with your business (e.g., the cost of movie tickets to a film critic). Entertainment included with recreational activities to benefit employees are still 100% deductible along with the meals.

The official definition of entertainment in the tax rules includes:

- Activity or facility that constitutes entertainment, amusement or recreation.
- Those that meet an individual's personal, living, or family needs.

Amusement or recreation includes entertaining at night clubs, cocktail lounges, theaters, country clubs, golf and athletic clubs, sporting events, and on hunting, fishing, or vacation trips. Personal needs relate to paying for a customer's hotel, vehicle or food as a courtesy.

While dues paid for social, athletic or sporting clubs (typically 501(c)(7) organizations) have been non-deductible for years, now the cost of activities associated with these clubs is also non-deductible. Dues and event fees paid to 501(c)(6) business organizations, such as trade associations and chambers of commerce, are still deductible, subject to the lobbying expense restrictions. Finally, the new tax law made charitable golf outing costs non-deductible, except for sponsorship fees and a charitable contribution for the profit made by the charity.

In summary, meals and entertainment expenses were curtailed in some areas but not others. It is very important to understand how these expenses differ within the three categories of 100% deductible, 50% deductible, and non-deductible, and adjust the accounting for these expenses accordingly.



Finally, be sure to keep adequate documentation, and look for more M&E changes by the IRS in the near future. ■

# New Qualified Business Income Tax Deduction

THE QUALIFIED BUSINESS INCOME (QBI) deduction is a new 20 percent deduction available under the Tax Cuts and Jobs Act beginning in tax year 2018. The QBI deduction is available to owners of pass-through entities, such as S corporations, partnerships, sole proprietorships, and many LLCs. Trusts, estates, and their beneficiaries may also qualify for the QBI deduction. Business owners claim the deduction on their individual income tax return on a new line on Form 1040 after determining adjusted gross income (AGI).

Qualified business income includes net income related to the conduct of a business within the United States. Items specifically excluded from the definition of QBI include wages, partnership guaranteed payments,



and investment-type income such as interest, dividends, and capital gains.

Eligibility for the QBI deduction depends on the owner's taxable income and the nature of the business. The QBI deduction is limited

to 20 percent of taxable income before the QBI deduction and net capital gain in all cases. Business owners who have qualified business income and whose 2018 taxable income before the QBI deduction and net capital gain is less than \$157,500 for single taxpayers and \$315,000 for married taxpayers filing jointly qualify for the 20 percent QBI deduction regardless of the type of business.

In contrast, no QBI deduction is permitted for owners of specified service businesses whose 2018 taxable income before the QBI deduction and net capital gain exceeds \$207,500 for single taxpayers and \$415,000 for married taxpayers filing jointly. Wage and property limitations apply when determining the QBI deduction for owners of non-specified service businesses whose 2018 taxable income exceeds \$207,500 for single taxpayers and \$415,000 for married taxpayers filing jointly.

Specified service businesses subject to the additional limitations include businesses which perform services in the fields of health, law, accounting, actuarial science, performing arts, consulting, financial services, athletics, brokerage services, investment management, trading, dealing, and any business in which the principal asset is the reputation or skill of one or more owners or employees. The reputation or skill category includes endorsement and licensing income related to an individual's image, likeness, or identity.

Engineering and architecture businesses are excluded from the definition of a specified service business. A business which provides a certain minimal

amount of services is also not treated as a specified service business.

Owners of businesses which rent property may qualify for the QBI deduction if the rental is considered a trade or business or if the business rents to certain related parties.

Taxpayers may not claim the QBI deduction on the Delaware personal income tax return, which begins with federal AGI.

The new Qualified Business Income deduction offers a significant tax benefit to owners of pass-through entities under the new tax law. Please



# Delaware Hospitals Committed to Value-Based Health Care

PROVIDING HEALTH CARE is a costly endeavor. The traditional fee-for-service payment model makes it more costly than it needs to be due to incentives inherent in that approach to reimbursement. The promise of tying reimbursement to value rests in different models broadly called value-based payment models.

Hospitals are equipped with the latest technology designed to meet the needs of every patient that walks in the door from setting a broken bone to delivering a child, performing an emergency operation or treating patients with multiple conditions. They also need to be staffed to meet emergencies twenty-four hours a day – hospitals cannot close overnight like other provider offices. Someone has to be the backstop for illnesses and accidents that don't occur at convenient times during the day.

In addition, hospitals and health care delivery systems must employ high quality physicians, nurses and other clinicians and professionals to meet patients' needs. With the average physician spending more than \$58,000 per year for medical school, tuition loan reimbursement is often needed in addition to offering competitive salaries for hospitals to attract top medical talent. Hiring enough nurses also presents a challenge that will only increase as Delaware's population ages and demands for care intensify.

In Delaware, our aging population is an added challenge. We are the seventh oldest state in the nation. As a result, health care demand will continue rise, as will costs, in order to meet growing needs in our state. Even with the high quality services currently delivered in Delaware to address the health needs of all, we recognize many factors make health care an expensive proposition. Can anything be done to ensure dollars are spent overall where they can help people live healthier lives for longer periods of time?

The primary need to address the economics of health care is to align incentives with value. The long-established fee-for-service system incentivizes more -- more tests, more visits, more billable items. Almost every serious thinker on health care economics realizes that fee-for-service must be replaced by value-based contracting. Designing and implementing value-based contracting holds the great promise of aligning incentives to maximize value in the system.

What does a value based contracting system look like? Such a system shares risk between hospitals, providers, individuals, and plan sponsors. Everyone needs a stake in a system that is designed to incentivize healthy behavior, population health and preventative care. A value based contracting system puts a premium on primary care and population health. Educating people, making sure people are engaged with a primary care provider, making sure people's health needs in the community are addressed all flow from a system designed to reduce chronic disease and keep people from having to go to hospital for expensive procedures and treatments for what ails them. Addressing conditions early or preventing

them from occurring in the first place can occur with timely and consistent primary care and excellent population health.

The hospitals and health systems of the Delaware Healthcare Association (DHA) are on the forefront of creating the new value-based payment systems for Delawareans. Payment reform incentivizes quality and positive patient outcomes. Payment reform will better ensure patient access to high quality health care, support a robust primary care system, and focus efforts on population health.

DHA has been a strong advocate for reform and actively participated in Delaware's State Innovation Model ("SIM") initiative. SIM worked to advance our State's health care delivery system in developing new delivery and payment models focused on moving toward value-based care, improving care coordination for chronic disease, reducing variations in care, and developing quality scorecards to assess health outcomes. DHA member health systems have also embraced new health and payment delivery structures like Accountable Care Organizations (ACOs) to tie reimbursement to value and quality. ACOs are shared savings programs where a groups of doctors, hospitals and other medical providers come together to provide coordinated high-quality care to their patients. If those providers come in below their expenditure goals, they get to share in the savings produced.

Value-based care is powerful and effective. Nationwide, hospitals participating in ACOs have saved millions of dollars for Medicare while delivering high quality, coordinated care. ACOs are an important step in the move toward other value-based payment models. Significantly, all adult general acute care hospitals in Delaware are Medicare ACO participants.

Payment reform isn't simple or cheap. Payment reform requires substantial investment in data collection and assessment tools and other infrastructure. Nationally, hospitals invest approximately \$5 - \$12 million initially and \$6.3 - \$14.1 million annually in time and resources to establish and maintain ACOs. This investment produces results -- hospital-affiliated ACOs are saving patients and Medicare millions of dollars -- \$174 million in net savings to Medicare in 2017 alone.

In addition to ACO participation, Delaware hospitals are also developing statewide Clinically Integrated Networks to assure the highest quality care. In partnership with legislators and the Administration last year, Delaware hospitals have committed to the goal of having 60% of patients under value-based contracts by 2021.


Hospitals are making significant commitments to value-based care, but we need insurers and our state partners to come together and work jointly with us to move toward value-based models. If providers, payers and state government join hands, our work together can achieve our shared goal of providing all Delawareans with accessible, high quality, and financially sustainable health care. ■

# Join the Movement to Grow the Future Health Care Workforce in Delaware

IT'S AN EXCITING and forward-looking time to be in the health care industry. As our work in building healthier communities evolves, so too do our workforce needs.

And, as we come together to better understand our community's needs, we will engage with our colleagues in education to inform training, work-based learning experiences, certification programs, and even middle- and high-school curricula.

Delaware is emerging as a national leader when it comes to career and technical education, and preparing young people for life after high school, thanks in part to our cross-sector collaboration among the K-12 public school system, local employers, community organizations and higher education. # Is Reference-Based Pricing Right for Your Company?

## Ask Yourself Three Questions.

ON AVERAGE, employers contributed \$5,711 per employee toward single coverage health insurance and \$14,069 toward family coverage in 2018, according to a 2018 employer health benefits study conducted by Kaiser Family Foundation. This represents a 10-year average increase of 43% for single coverage (from \$3,983 to \$5,711) and 51% for family coverage (from \$9,325 to \$14,069).

Correspondingly, the average employee contributions toward single and family coverage have both increased by 65%—from \$721 to \$1,186 for single coverage and from \$3,354 to \$5,547 for family coverage—since 2008. To remain competitive, employers are researching alternatives that will reduce health insurance costs for both the company and its employees.

One of the emerging trends in healthcare is reference-based pricing (RBP), but how do you know if it's the right solution for your company? Ask yourself these three questions as you evaluate insurance cost-saving options for your organization.

### 1. Does my company have the data to evaluate RBP?

When considering an alternative financing arrangement like RBP, you must first determine if your company has sufficient historical claims data to allow the underwriters to quote for RBP. Whether your company is self-insured or fully-insured with a large number of enrolled employees, if you have detailed information regarding claims experience, you'll have more accurate projections to evaluate RBP as a potential cost-saving option for your business.

### 2. What benefits does RBP offer my company and its employees?

Reference-based pricing lowers an employer's costs by eliminating the traditional healthcare insurance system where the network, providers, and facilities assign the charges for patient services, which are often inflated. With an RBP plan, employers by way of their co-fiduciary negotiate a fixed-price contract for non-emergency healthcare services with various providers based on 1) a percentage above what Medicare would pay for the same service or, 2) cost plus a reasonable percentage above cost. This establishes costs that are fair and affordable yet still create a profit margin for the providers.

In addition to cost savings for the company and employees, individuals can be more actively involved in their healthcare choices, which creates a feeling of empowerment. Employees can research the medical services they need, select the best provider based on their needs, and better understand the overall cost before they receive care.

When considering the advantages, you must also consider any drawbacks for your company. For example, employee cooperation is vital for an RBP program to work. Since RBP is very different from traditional insurance plans, a coordinated, ongoing employee education program is extremely important when implementing an RBP plan. Employees also need to fully understand the "balance billing" process and monitor their medical bills and explanation of benefits statements closely so they don't inadvertently pay more for their services than they should. Finally,

depending on the provider agreement structure and negotiating power of the company's balance billing partner, employees could face massive medical bills that cause financial stress or foster poor employee relations.

### 3. Do I have access to trusted healthcare partners to administer an RBP plan?

For companies that feel confident its employees will benefit from an RBP program, the final question to ask is whether there are expert partners in your geographic area to help administer and manage the RBP plan. This includes a variety of healthcare partners, such as: service providers—hospitals, pharmacies, imaging centers, and others—that enter contractual agreements to participate in RBP without sacrificing quality of care; a service coordinator that helps employees evaluate and coordinate their care; a third-party administrator (TPA) that processes medical claims; and a "balance billing" partner that audits employee medical invoices, negotiates discounts on their behalf, and offers legal services to reduce litigation.

With the goal of creating more transparency to healthcare costs through fixed pricing, RBP can be a powerful savings alternative to traditional health insurance systems. ## Exposure Represents the First Step to Learning

IN PURSUIT OF FINANCIAL FREEDOM, young people are discovering there are many barriers to entering the workforce. Leading the way is the gap in fundamental soft skills that make it difficult for employers to retain adolescents and young adults. “According to the Bureau of Labor Statistics, Delaware’s unemployment rate is 4.3 percent, however the youth unemployment rate is 14.8 percent, and minority teen unemployment is an eye-opening 24.8 percent. Unemployed youth don’t fare better as they get older. Studies show that it gets more challenging to find work if you haven’t worked during your teenage years” (Leishman, 2017). So how do we counter the increasing rates and trends in youth employment? We increase young people’s exposure to the world of work and strengthen the skills necessary to compete in the changing economy.

For many students, especially those with significant barriers, the road to higher education and employment can look vastly different. Consequently, employment opportunities are based on their capacity to leverage education, skills and abilities to gain and sustain jobs that will provide livable wages. By providing students with opportunities to connect the dots between school and work, we can change the trajectory of how young people perceive employment and perform in the workplace.

Programs like Jobs for Delaware Graduates, Inc. (JDG) work to address the need for soft-skill and employment training for middle and high school students. JDG is a non-profit, dropout prevention program designed to prepare at-risk youth to transition from school to work. The program implements a comprehensive curriculum based on 37 fundamental employability areas including critical thinking, employment interviews, business etiquette, pay and benefits, workplace diversity, and financial planning.

To reinforce skills delivered in the classroom, JDG recently piloted an internship program, known as C.O.R.E. (Creating Opportunities through Real Experiences), to help students gain the confidence to perform in the working world. Through a partnership with Christiana Care Health System, Integrity Staffing Solutions, Bloom Energy, and Goodwill Industries, JDG developed an experiential learning placement program that would allow 11th and 12th grade students to shadow with experienced professionals from a list of traditional and non-traditional fields. The C.O.R.E. Internship Program facilitates learning in ways that keeps students motivated to graduate with the skills they need for



the future. From clinical engineering to culinary arts, participants gain exposure to real-world situations that help them explore career options, sharpen their professional skills, develop positive attitudes around employment, and make informed decisions about their post-secondary pursuits.

The JDG model has been replicated in 34 states with over 1000 program affiliates. Jobs for America’s Graduates (JAG) is a state-based national non-profit organization dedicated to preventing dropouts among young people who are most at-risk. In more than three decades of operation, JAG has delivered consistent, compelling results – helping nearly three-quarters of a million young people stay in school through graduation, pursue post-secondary education, and secure quality jobs leading to career advancement opportunities.

The value of youth employment opportunities has proven to benefit the student, community and local economy. Students who gain industry knowledge with applications in the field strengthen their ability to perform and compete for jobs, college, and scholarships on a higher level. Employers who are willing to partner with programs like Jobs for Delaware Graduates, help to strengthen the pipeline of talent that will occupy positions throughout Delaware in the coming years. ■



The merger includes the Paper and Water assets of BASF's Performance Chemicals unit, including production sites in Bradford and Grimsby, UK; Suffolk, Virginia, USA; Altamira, Mexico; Ankleshwar, India; and Kwinana, Australia and related assets including intellectual property. BASF's paper coating chemical business is not part of the transaction.

## Chesapeake Utilities Corporation Announces Grant Levels for 2019 Energy Bill Assistance

Chesapeake Utilities Corporation (NYSE: CPK), announced today the availability of grants through its SHARING program, a nonprofit organization that provides funds to the Company's natural gas and propane gas customers living on the Delmarva Peninsula who need financial assistance to pay their gas bills or to repair their gas appliances. 
